## San Antonio Park

San Antonio Park is an important playground for the Russian Jack neighborhood. The Russian Jack Community Council identified a toddler playground as a needed addition to the neighborhood and the park was eventually constructed in 2004. The playground and safety surfacing are not compliant with current industry-wide safety standards. Funds will be used to upgrade these features and fix neighborhood park amenities.

In the summer of 2016, the Anchorage Park Foundation and Parks & Recreation Department plan to complete improvements in San Antonio Park with the help of community volunteers and the input of a neighborhood park committee. We invite the Alaska State Legislature to join us in investing in the future of San Antonio Park and the Russian Jack community. The Anchorage Park Foundation will match legislative investment in neighborhood park fix-its with volunteer involvement and generous support from the Rasmuson Foundation's Anchorage Parks Initiative
