Anchorage Park Foundation (APF) Community Challenge Grant Program 2022 Request for Proposals

The Community Challenge Grant Program was created as a way to bring community engagement and stewardship to Anchorage's public spaces. This program has two overarching goals: (1) Improve Anchorage parks, trails and facilities (2) Support individuals, neighborhoods, organizations and businesses that value volunteerism and stewardship for public lands.

Who can apply? Individuals, families, neighbor groups, community councils, private businesses, organized recreation groups and nonprofits.

The project must:

1. Benefit the public;
2. Be completed by Oct. 30, 2023;
3. Be a capital improvement project that takes place in an Anchorage municipal park, facility, or on a trail; and
4. Demonstrate the ability to raise 1:1 in community match. For example, a \$20,000 project could be awarded \$10,000 if applicant's proposal meets guidelines to raise \$10,000 in any combination of match from cash donations, volunteer time, non-federal grants or donated materials.

Award considerations and priorities - May include, but aren't limited to projects that:

- Meet an identified public need;
- Encourage volunteerism and stewardship of public lands;
- Elevate community diversity, accessibility, and inclusivity;
- Promote opportunities for increased individual and community health;
- Fit within an approved park master plan;
- Identify community support and partnerships;
- Demonstrate the ability to complete the project;
- Benefit youth and underserved communities;
- Add value to projects (such as existing or proposed park bond projects);
- Utilize Youth Employment in Parks work crews;
- Give consideration or understanding to continued maintenance needs;

2022 Grant Application Timeline

January 18, 2022: Application period opens

February 23 and March 3, 2022: Project Assistance

Two workshops are set to help those interested in getting free advice on their project from the Alaska Chapter of the American Society of Landscape Architects and from park planners with Anchorage Parks and Recreation. The meetings are currently scheduled to be in-person at the locations below.

March 17, 2022: Application period closes

Applications due by midnight Alaska time.

April 20, 2022: Notification sent via email to all applicants stating if their application was selected or not selected.

May 13, 2022: Noon – Public announcement and kickoff celebration with grantees at local park.

June 1, 2022-October 15, 2023: Grantee period of performance

The period of performance is the period of time during which the grantee is expected to raise and spend approved funds and complete the grant-funded activities.

October 30, 2023: Final reports due from awarded grantees.

2022 Grant Application Review Process

Grant applications received by the March 17, 2022 deadline will be reviewed in a competitive process based on available funding. A Community Challenge Grant Committee that includes Municipal Parks and Recreation staff recommends a grantee slate to the Anchorage Park Foundation Board of Directors to approve and award.

In some instances, proposals may require more public involvement and approvals, including but not limited to community council, permitting, Parks and Recreation Commission, Urban Design Commission, and Planning and Zoning Commission. Proposals may be awarded time to complete public process.
