2024	Girdwood Tee Pads	Anchorage Disc Golf Association	\$ 3,000	Girdwood Disc Golf Course	Anchorage Disc Golf Association (ADGA) improved the playing surface of the FREE Girdwood Disk Golf course by constructing new tee pads. ADGA provides maintenance and upkeep of all the disc golf courses in the municipality of Anchorage – Kincaid Park, Davis Park, Peter’s Creek and Girdwood. The Girdwood course is an 18-hole course that winds its way through the park between California Creek and Glacier Creek and is suitable for all skill levels. Udisc, a disc golf score keeping app, has recorded on average 1,896 rounds per year from registered users year-round regardless of weather. The ADGA hosts 2 of the most popular tournaments of the year at this course, with a field of more than 100 players each from all over the state.
2024	Johnny Ellis Rainbow Bridge Park Improvements	Friends of Johnny Ellis	\$ 5,000	Johnny Ellis Rainbow Bridge Park	After applying for the challenge grant in 2024, friends and staff of former Senator Johnny Ellis worked with the Assembly to pass an ordinance to honor the late Senator with a park in his name. Johnny Ellis Rainbow Bridge Park is a linear park that runs along A Street from 9th to 15th Ave. Assembly Member Daniel Volland sponsored a \$100k park bond that voters overwhelmingly approved. The theme of the park is inclusive, and in 2026 Parks and Recreation will install colorful park benches, bike racks, flower boxes and interpretive signage to tell the story of the beloved Senator who championed parks and neighborhoods. He passed away on February 9, 2022. He was 61.
2024	Mirror Lake Singletrack Trail System	Chugach Mountain Bike Riders	\$ 10,000	Mirror Lake Park	CMBR completed two major trail construction projects with contractor ProTrails at Mirror Lake Park in summer 2025 to serve beginners and advanced. Lemon Squeezy, also known as the Lakeside connector, is the new green-rated trail with a boardwalk/bridge providing year-round access across sensitive wetland areas, creating a family-friendly loop option with the Lakeside trail. The new El Jefe jump line is the system's first dedicated black diamond jump line. This challenging trail features rollable jumps for experienced riders, with an innovative intermediate-level adaptive mountain bike (aMTB) parallel line funded by the grant.
2024	Secure Bike Parking installation	Bike Anchorage	\$ 12,000	Nunaka Valley South, Russian Jack Springs Park, & Valley of the Moon Park	With the goal of encouraging new bike users on Anchorage’s protected trail system, Bike Anchorage selected locations to ensure that kids have a safe, off-street route to get to the park. Grant funds were used to purchase three sets of bike racks and hardware from Sportworks, an American manufacturer of high-quality bike parking infrastructure; and to pay GMG General, a local concrete contractor, to pour concrete pads for the foundation.

2024	Restoring Arnold Muldoon Park & Trails	Friends of Stream	\$ 13,250	Arnold Muldoon Park & Trails	Students at charter middle school Anchorage STreAM Academy spent the 2024 fall and 2025 Spring school years doing volunteer cleanups and outdoor learning on the Arnold Muldoon Trail system located near Muldoon and Northern Lights. Their school was located adjacent to the park at that time, and they have been active partners in APF's Schools on Trails program. Youth Employment in Parks crews followed up in summer 2025 to improve 1700 feet (about the size of the Empire State Building) of muddy trails at the park. Volunteer hours were used to match the cost of bridges, gravel and supplies. The STreAM Academy has since moved into the former Nunaka Valley Elementary School building, where they are focusing on volunteer projects at Nunaka Valley Park and Russian Jack Springs Park.
2024	Land survey for Castle Heights Park	Friends of Castle Heights Park	\$ 5,000	Castle Heights Park	Castle Heights Park is a small park located near the trails that circle University Lake. Friends of Castle Park obtained an experienced surveyor who spent 60 hours volunteering to map the park with fellow neighbors. The survey is required to help parks and recreation plan new improvements, such as a picnic shelter, playground equipment, and a trail.
2024	Wayfinding for Government Hill Parks and Trails	Government Hill Community Council	\$ 14,000	Sunset Park, Suzan Nightingale McKay Memorial Park, & Brown's Point Park	Government Hill has three miles of well-maintained trails and 11 parks, providing ample opportunity for exploration and recreation. Interpretive signage telling stories of people and places were installed at Sunset Park, Suzan Nightingale McKay Memorial Park, and Brown's Point Park. Directional signage will be installed in spring to further assist visitors to navigate the loop trail system and enjoy the breathtaking views they provide of Mount Denali, Mount Susitna, the Alaska Range, the Port of Alaska, and the Alaska Railroad in action. Grant funds were used to hire a graphic designer and for installation. The posts were provided by Anchorage Parks and Recreation.
2024	Revitalizing + Reactivating Williwaw Park	Catholic Social Services	\$ 12,100	Williwaw Park	Catholic Social Services volunteers worked with Anchorage Parks and Recreation to design and paint a mural on the basketball court at Williwaw Park. Grant funds also supported fixing the playground and adding wood fiber for safety. Volunteers also helped design a future community garden at the location.
2024	Karl Eid Ski Jump Staircase Repair	Nordic Ski Association of Anchorage	\$ 16,988	Hilltop Ski Area & Bike Park	Since 1983, the Karl Eid Ski Jumping Complex at Hilltop Ski Area has been offering the opportunity for kids and adults to fly into the air off a 65-meter ramp. But did you ever wonder how they got up there? Stairs! Volunteer Mike Jokela designed the staircase using Auto CAD in the fall of 2024. In the summer of 2025 materials were purchased at SBS and cut off site by Mike. Supports were then installed with a large volunteer effort. The site was then surveyed so make sure all other materials could be installed properly. Over three more weekend, a massive volunteer effort installed the remaining parts of the staircase. In early August Mike finished up the staircase with metal railing. The staircase is located at Hilltop Ski Area and Bike Park. It can be used by individuals and athletes year-round.

2024	Far North Bicentennial Park Trail Improvements	Alaska Trails	\$ 23,000	Far North Bicentennial Park	Alaska Trails leveraged their Challenge Grant with multiple funding sources to complete a five-week improvement project on the Moose Ridge Trail in Far North Bicentennial Park. The work enhanced safety and long-term sustainability along the loop between the Campbell Airstrip and North Bivouac trailheads. A paid trail crew, Youth Employment in Parks participants, and volunteers rerouted a section around a stream, repaired a connector to the Moose Ridge Loop, installed a boardwalk over a swamp, and constructed a new bridge. Accomplishments included building a 300-foot switchback, 300 feet of boardwalk, a 20-foot high-capacity bridge, and a crushed-rock causeway; brushing 2.5 miles of trail; removing 17 hazard trees; and hardening hundreds of feet of tread. The project was made possible through partnerships with Rasmuson Foundation, Youth Employment in Parks, Republic Services, The Home Depot Foundation, and Alaska Community Foundation.
2024	Welcoming Parks Project in Russian Jack Springs Park – Polar Bear Park	Alaska Literacy Program	\$ 31,855	Russian Jack Springs Park	Alaska Literacy Program volunteers have made Russian Jack Springs Park (RJSP) a more inclusive space reflective of the diverse community members in Anchorage. Erin LoPorto worked with 23 Peer Leader Navigators who collectively are fluent in 21 different languages (Amharic, Arabic, Temne, Krio, Dari, Pashto, Korean, Japanese, Nuer, Russian, Ukrainian, Spanish, Turkish, German, Samoan, Tongan, French, Kinyarwanda, Lingala, Swahili, and Farsi). She organized 19 individual meetings to select, research, and refine the content on the signs. All 24 signs provide relevant information for kids and families. Two immigrant artists contributed original artwork to accompany the PLN-driven content, arranged together on Canva. Signs will be installed in December 2025. Volunteers cleaned up trash at volunteer events and hosted community gatherings for immigrant families.
2024	Downtown Sunshine Plaza Parklet Revitalization	Anchorage Downtown Partnership & Northern Compass Group	\$ 20,000	Downtown Sunshine Plaza	Downtown plays a critical role in the economic and social health of our city. The ADP and local business owners worked with Anchorage Parks and Recreation to secure authorization to make upgrades to facilitate future year-round events to enhance downtown's vibrancy. The small plaza is owned by the Muni but leased by out-of-state owners of Sunshine Plaza. Adjacent property owners of Alaska Marketplace added the parklet to their paid security patrol. ADP crews power washed the property. Photo above shows the six light stands designed and constructed by Cook Contracting using a design found in Philadelphia, PA in their public spaces. Items were built locally by Steelfab with concrete from AK Sand and Gravel. They installed a lockable electrical box for commercial grade cables and string lights. They repaired the walkway cover, including glass/plexiglass and powder coating. And they replaced railings on the stairs to comply with the current ADA size and code. The lights are now installed, and a celebration is planned for December 2025.

2024	Earthquake Park Trail Improvements	Turnagain Neighbors	\$ 14,992	Earthquake Park	Three Turnagain neighbors volunteered nearly 400 hours to limit erosion, improve drainage, and make the trail useable year-round. Work included assembling nine 8' by 4' fiberglass grates to build four much-needed bridges. The Earthquake Park trail parallels the Tony Knowles Coastal Trail and provides a quiet diversion from the more active Coastal Trail. Several species of hawks, owls and other bird species have been observed there in addition to moose, black bear, and the occasional lynx and fox. The unique landscape in Earthquake Park offers rare examples of the impacts of the 1964 quake. It's a rare gem in our city, with a labyrinth of social trails for year-round biking, skiing, walking and rolling. Youth Employment in Parks worked alongside the volunteers to fortify the trails with gravel and two additional bridges to complete the project.
2024	Baxter Bog Trail Repair	Scenic Foothills Community Council	\$ 16,738	Baxter Bog Park	Nearly 100 people gathered on November 1 to celebrate volunteers, trails, and community at Baxter Bog, Pfeiffer Park, and the Alicia Iden Nature Trail. With support from an engineer, volunteers, and Youth Employment in Parks crews, the project improved and strengthened the 1.5-mile Alicia Iden loop and its access points for long-term resilience. Beyond trail work, the effort built community connections across generations, inspired renewed giving from local champions, and led to updated trail signage. The project highlighted the importance of Rasmuson Foundation support in strengthening Anchorage parks, trails, and neighborhoods.
2022	Winchester Park Trail Development	Volunteer	\$ 3,100	Winchester Park	The project has two goals: develop access easements to a park and gain momentum for master plan development for Spruce and Winchester Parks. The parks are surrounded by residential development and do not have master plans. To define the "10' walkway" easement bordering private property, a licensed land surveyor will locate the easement, then it will be physically defined with wooden bollards, chips and brush clearing. The trail will lead to an existing primitive path from Parkridge Circle which will also be soft chipped.
2022	Eastchester Park Beautification	Fairview Community Council	\$ 6,920	Eastchester Park	Led by Fairview Community Council members, the project will establish a stronger sense of place at Eastchester Park through strategic placing of nine Birch trees, two planter boxes and eight shrubs planted parallel to 20th Avenue. The planters will be planted with berry bushes to increase local access to natural foods. This project will help gain momentum for community involvement in park improvements with the voter approval of a 2022 bond for Eastchester Park.
2022	Scenic Park Pickleball Court	Midnight Sun Pickleball	\$ 7,500	Scenic Park	With the support of Scenic Foothills Community Council, pickleball fans will convert one of the two lightly used tennis courts into a dual-purpose tennis/pickleball court, leaving the other one solely for tennis. Volunteers will also improve an entrance to the park that is adjacent to Scenic Park Elementary School.
2022	Fairview Lions Park Beautification	Neighborworks Alaska	\$ 4,000	Fairview Lions Park	Neighborworks Alaska will organize volunteer days to work with parks and recreation on numerous park improvements. They will weed, re-mulch and build new planters at the existing community garden plots, install two bear-proof trash cans, re-paint fence and timber retention walls, remove graffiti on picnic shelter and benches as needed, and find appropriate locations for two dog stations.

2022	Kincaid Park Disc Golf Improvements	Alaska Disc Golf Association	\$ 10,000	Kincaid Park	Volunteers with the Alaska Disc Golf Association will improve erosion and safety concerns around the tee boxes throughout the course and install 18 Innova DISCatcher Pro 28 baskets. The Kincaid disc golf course gets played 15k times a season and is considered by many the best course in the State. The new baskets will accommodate more users at all skill levels.
2022	Forsythe Park Outdoor Learning Lab	Volunteers	\$ 10,752	Forsythe Park	Teachers, parents and students at O'Malley Elementary are creating an outdoor learning space at Forsythe Park. They worked closely with Anchorage Park Foundation's Schools on Trails program to design a map to access the trails and flora in the park. O'Malley third graders designed and will install a field identification guide for 6 different trees in the park. Youth Employment in Parks crews will work with volunteers to make the park's bridge over the South Fork of Little Campbell Creek accessible to all users. Contractors will be hired to install an observation viewing platform and bench along the creek for outdoor learning.
2022	Tikishla Park/Chester Creek Trail Prunus Padus Chokecherry	Volunteers	\$ 5,000	Tikishla Park	With the support of the Airport Heights Community Council, Tikishla Park neighbors are uniting to fight off invasive chokecherry (mayday) trees that are harmful to wildlife and salmon in Chester Creek. Their goal is to eradicate chokecherry from the park and adjoining spur trails once and for all, through a series of strategic volunteer events.
2022	Fish Creek Tunnel Art	Spenard Community Council	\$ 12,240	Fish Creek Trail	A mosaic frieze will be centered in the bike trail tunnel that runs under Spenard Road. The concept envisions a repeating pattern of salmon skin/scales with fluid, riffle lines hinting at the movement of water as it flows over the surface of the scales. The material used for the mosaic are decommissioned road signs. For pedestrians and bikers, signage often seems directed towards cars rather than non-motorized means of transportation. This mosaic redirects that impulse and creates an artwork specifically for trail users. A combination of shadow and direct light source will cause the mosaic frieze to reflect, shine and highlight the surface patinas. The shimmering effects will be especially dramatic in Winter when trail users often use head lamps to illuminate their way.
2022	Cuddy Family Midtown Park Fish Creek Watershed Interpretation	Friends of Fish Creek	\$ 15,835	Cuddy Family Midtown Park	Friends of Fish Creek will work with local artist and videographer Max Romey to create an outreach and education interpretive panel telling the story of Fish Creek. Voters approved a feasibility study in 2022 to research options for restoring this once vibrant watershed. The artistic display will be installed at Cuddy Park, which is home to ponds created by the creek. It will depict a free-flowing Fish Creek in the main map, with "scene bubbles" showing people recreating on a trail, families picnicking and coho salmon returning as envisioned by a coalition of advocates working to "daylight" this watershed that was channeled underground in the 1950s to allow midtown development.

2022	Brotherhood/Sisterhood Park Baseball Field Improvements	Anchorage West Little League	\$ 10,000	Brotherhood/Sisterhood Park	Anchorage West Little League plans a to improve a youth baseball field to encourage more young people to stay in the sport and improve their health. This field hosts practices and games for Dimond West Little League and Anchorage West Little League's older players (12-16 years old). It is one of the city's few full-size fields available to kids of that age group, and it is used six days a week from late April through mid-July. The field has seen better days and needs some tender loving care. Projects include resurfacing, improving facilities and installing a new pitcher's mound and sprinkler system.
2022	Westchester Lagoon Bird Platform	Anchorage Waterways Council	\$ 25,000	Westchester Lagoon	Anchorage Waterways Council will lead an effort to restore the degraded shoreline and bank at the Westchester Lagoon Waterfowl Sanctuary, build a viewing platform and educate the public about this important habitat for wildlife. Located at the bottom of the Spenard Road hill at 19 th Avenue, this area is popular for birdwatching. The project is designed to improve human access, discourage waterfowl feeding, and reduce bank erosion from dogs, waterfowl and visitors.
2022	Far North Bicentennial Park Trails	Volunteers	\$ 24,000	Far North Bicentennial Park	Volunteers will work with Youth Employment in Parks crews to improve up to 7 miles of trail in Anchorage's largest urban park. Trail surfaces will be leveled, sight distances will be increased, and drainage issues will be addressed. New wayfinding signs will be installed throughout the park in necessary areas to improve visitor experience and safety.
2022	Kincaid Park Singletrack Trail Improvements	Singletrack Advocates	\$ 10,000	Kincaid Park	Singletrack Advocates (STA) will improve the mountain biking experience on three single track trails at Kincaid Park – the Bolling Alley, Good Greeff, and Mighty Bike trails. They will purchase and install up to seven prefabricated progressive bike ramps comprised of a steel structure and cedar decking surface, and make necessary trail upgrades including tread work, trail reroutes, and installing signage.
2022	Russian Jack Springs Park singletrack trails	Alaska Trails	\$ 35,000	Russian Jack Springs Park	Volunteers with Alaska Trails will work with Youth Employment in Parks crews to build beginner and intermediate level mountain bike trails in this East Anchorage park. The design will include a special skills development area, a first for Anchorage and something that the local cycling community desperately needs. The trails will also be designed to appeal to those who ride BMX and dirt jump bikes. With its connections to the Chester Creek trail and greenbelt system, and supported by a 2022 Master Plan, Russian Jack's new mountain bike trails will complement existing Nordic ski trails.
2022	Meadow Park Picnic Shelter and Accessibility Improvements	Rilke Schule German School of Arts & Sciences	\$ 15,000	Meadow Park	This project has two main goals: improve the park experience for the public and students at Polaris K-12 and Rilke Schule German School of Arts & Sciences, and gain momentum for a park bond to build ADA accessible sidewalks, parking, and a picnic shelter. Since adopting the park in 2015, volunteers with Rilke Schule have worked hard to make this park an asset to the community. These proposed improvements, will give the school & community a sheltered place to gather, parking to accommodate increased park use, & ensure residents & students have a safe route to schools through the neighborhood.

2019	Ruth Arcand Park Trail	Pacific Northern Academy	\$ 18,500	Ruth Arcand Park	Teachers and staff with Pacific Northern Academy celebrated the completion of a new nature trail through Ruth Arcand Park. The new trail marked the completion of a challenge grant originally awarded in the 2017 cycle. The new Ruth Arcand Trail connects with this trail system and runs from Spring Hill Elementary and Hanshew Middle School to a pedestrian underpass under Lake Otis. The trail was completed in July of 2019 by crews with Youth Employment in Parks. Before their work began, crews carefully surveyed the forest floor to create a low-grade trail that would be more accessible for individuals using wheelchairs and mobility difficulties.
2019	Centennial Park Eagle Scout Project	Eagle Scout	\$ 2,175	Centennial Park	This project installed new campsite signs at one of the only campgrounds in the Anchorage Bowl. Eagle Scout replaced identification plates for campsites and fixed informational signs at the park's entrance.
2019	Far North Bicentennial Park Sled Dog Trail Safety Signage	Alaska Sled Dog Racing Association	\$ 2,243	Far North Bicentennial Park	The Alaska Sled Dog Racing Association (ASDRA) provided new signage in Far North Bicentennial Park to clearly delineate which trails are designated for mushers. In October 2019 ASDRA volunteers ordered new signs and organized volunteer installation days. Volunteers used their own equipment to drill holes for sign posts and install them.
2019	Rabbit Creek Park Trail Improvements	Volunteer	\$ 40,000	Rabbit Creek Park	A community member and YEP teens transformed a popular social trail into a permanent gravel trail complete with new signs, dog waste disposal stations, benches, and landscape improvements. The project is a safe route to school for students attending Rabbit Creek Elementary and South High School.
2019	Chester Creek Single Track Safety Signage	South Addition Community Council	\$ 5,000	Chester Creek Trail	Anchorage's newest single-track trail near Valley of the Moon Park will receive new signage in summer 2022. South Addition Community Council Vice President organized several successful volunteer events to remove invasive chokecherry/Mayday tree/European Bird Cherry/Prunus padus on the Chester Creek Trail.
2019	Folker Park Reflexology Path	Alaska Reflexology Association	\$ 21,000	Folker Park	Volunteers with the Alaska Reflexology Association (AKRA) raised more than \$40,000 for the project, including one \$20,000 donation. It is one of the only public therapeutic reflexology paths in the world, with a unique artistic design. This project generated one of the highest on record volunteer matches, with more than \$50,000 of volunteer time logged in 2019 and 2020. The volunteer power leveraged a matching grant from AARP to install music equipment in the park as well. Phase 1 construction of Folker Park has completely transformed the once-neglected UMed Park into an inviting space for neighbors, students, and medical patients in the community. Physical and occupational therapists bring their clients to the area to take advantage of the park's theme as an "intergenerational health and healing park."
2019	Taku Lake Park Skatepark Renovation and Expansion		\$ 40,000	Taku Lake Skate Park	Owners of South Anchorage's Blue & Gold Board Shop, assembled an amazing team of skating advocates to help raise funds for renovating the skate park. With the addition of other funding sources, the park will be transformed into a 5-8,000 ft concrete skatepark at the same site as the current equipment.

2019	Chanshtnu Muldoon Park Food Forest and Community Garden	Volunteer	\$ 29,115	Chanshtnu Muldoon Park	The Food Forest and Community Garden continues a Challenge Grant awarded in 2017 cycle. Volunteers grafted 39 fruit trees and cultivated 120 shrubs that were installed in 2021 with more than 100 volunteers and a summer of events. Youth Employment in Parks helped build a trail and install wheelchair-friendly community garden plots.
2019	Moen Park Exercise Equipment	Volunteer	\$ 20,000	Moen Park	A park neighbor organized volunteer clean up and trail maintenance events and purchased new adult fitness equipment in Moen Park.
2019	Bonnie Cusack Memorial Rink Center Upgrades	Anchorage Skate Club	\$ 40,000	Bonnie Cusack Memorial Outdoor Rink Center	Anchorage Skate Club secured approval and support from surrounding community councils for much needed security and landscaping upgrades to the Bonnie Cusack Memorial Rink Center. Security fencing is installed. Volunteers organized tree planting and landscaping upgrades to the rinks entrance and parking lot to meet their cash match.
2019	Spenard Beach Park Improvements	Spenard and Turnagain Community Councils	\$ 10,000	Spenard Beach Park	Spenard and Turnagain Community Councils (SCC and TCC) teamed up to improve this favorite spot for tourists and neighbors to watch the activities at the busiest floatplane base in the world. Volunteer days at the park will supplement their cash match. In summer of 2022 look for new benches, picnic tables and trash cans at this lakeside park popular with birders and people walking the loop around the lake.
2019	Girdwood Lower Iditarod National Historic Trail	Girdwood Trails Committee	\$ 5,000	Girdwood	The Girdwood Trails Committee led in the completion of the Girdwood Lower Iditarod NHT from the Girdwood valley entrance to Crow Pass Trail. Phase 2 segment was approximately 1/3 of a mile and improved the section of trail from Ruane Rd to Karolius Road. This project will help to transform a social trail into a more accessible path for users. Completed work will also improve sightlines, drainage, and create a new hardpacked trail surface.
2019	Woodside (Eastchester) Park Improvements	Fairview Community Council	\$ 17,000	Eastchester Park	Fairview Community Council made several improvements at Woodside or Eastchester Park to provide a unique "Fairview neighborhood identity" for the park. The neighborhood raised funds and organized volunteer events to support sprucing up the park through aesthetic improvements including artful visual wraps for utility boxes and tree plantings.
2019	Free Little Libraries in Parks	Best Beginnings	\$ 3,500	Multiple Parks	Best Beginnings is embarking on a pilot project to install new free little libraries in parks throughout Anchorage. A Little Free Library is a "take a book, return a book" free book exchange. Anyone may take a book or bring a book to share. The officially registered little free libraries would be stocked twice annually, geared towards children under the age of 5.
2017	Fairview Park Improvements	Fairview Community Council	\$ 8,518	Fairview Lions Park	The Fairview Community Council and Anchorage Community Land Trust worked with neighbors to improve Fairview Park landscaping, amenities, and art.
2017	Folker Park Fitness Equipment	Friends of Folker Park	\$ 12,500	Folker Park	Friends of Folker Park and Providence Horizon House leveraged the voter-approved park bond to raise additional funds for accessible fitness equipment at Anchorage's first intergenerational health and healing park, located in the U-med district.

2017	Hostetler Park Renovations Victims for Justice	Victims for Justice	\$ 10,000	Hostetler Park	Victims for Justice and the Anchorage Downtown Rotary built a safe and accessible pathway to the memorial and improved the park for visitors. This sweet memorial park in the heart of Downtown honors victims of violent crimes.
